Tips to help improve your child's attendance at school

Positive attendance at school is important to ensure that students are able to maximise all opportunities for learning and developing their health and wellbeing:

Some tips/ideas to support this are:

- Talk to your child about school and how important it is. You can ask them how they feel about school, what they liked and if there are any problems.
- Reward good behaviour and not bad behaviour. For example, if your child refuses to go to school, do not let them have access to their phones or the internet.
- Set a good example. Show them how you keep to your own commitments.
- Encourage your child to take on hobbies that your child enjoys such as sports and clubs. This will help them develop positive relationships outside of the classroom.
- Have a set time to do homework and go to bed.
- Leave all technology out of their bedroom.
- Pack their school bag the night before with everything they need.
- Have a set time for breakfast.

Plan to meet up with a friend so they can travel to school together.



Supporting your child's learning and Literacy skills

Families play a key role in developing a child's language and literacy skills from birth.

A child's understanding of the world and their capacity to learn is greatly influenced by how much their family values their literacy skills.

Some important information for parents and carers to consider:

- Children who start school with greater literacy skills perform better in school, and not just in language-based subjects like English.
- Literacy in the early years is a range of different activities and forms of communication, including music, movement, dance, storytelling, visual arts and drama, as well as talking, viewing, reading, drawing and writing. It is never too early to read to your child.
- Oral language skills are an important predictor of reading and writing skills, so the better your child can speak, the better their overall literacy skills will develop. Talk as much as you can with your child and engage them in conversation often. Literacy in children's early years can always be fun. Excursions and playtime are great activities in which to engage and talk with your child. Fun activities are also the best opportunities to teach children new vocabulary and new ways of saying things.

<u>Literacy for students with a second language.</u>

You are your child's first and most important teacher.

You must speak, read and write with your child in your home language: the language you know best. Doing this will help them:

- learn at school
- build their identity and culture

learn English.

It can take your child some time to learn English after their first language. Your child will not be disadvantaged if they don't speak English at home.

How to use the language you know best

Here are some ways you can speak, read and write with your child in your home language:

- Sing, talk, play number games and read to your child in your home language.
- Speak your home language during family trips and celebrations.
- Speak to your child in your home language even if your child replies in English. This is so they can hear the differences between the two languages.

Help your child with their homework in your home language. This will help them build skills at school. For example, if they

learn maths in your language, they will understand how to do this in English.

How to use the language you know best

Here are some ways you can speak, read and write with your child in your home language:

- Sing, talk, play number games and read to your child in your home language.
- Speak your home language during family trips and celebrations.
- Speak to your child in your home language even if your child replies in English. This is so they can hear the differences between the two languages. Help your child with their homework in your home language. This will help

them build skills at school. For example, if they learn maths in your language, they will understand how to do this in English.



The benefits of being bilingual

If you speak, read and write with your child in your home language, you are helping them become bilingual. Bilingual means they can speak more than one language.

Being bilingual has many benefits:

- promoting growth in the brain. This helps your child think more creatively and solve problems more easily.
- building English literacy. This helps your child become a better reader, listener and speaker.
- improving memory, concentration and numeracy

building your child's sense of identity and their connection to family, community and culture.

Bilingual children tend to have higher scores in maths, reading and vocabulary tests.

Being bilingual also creates many opportunities for your child later in life when they start a career.

It's important to keep speaking, reading and writing with your child in your home language

Encouraging Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) skills in students

By showing your child that you have a positive attitude to STEM and you see the great possibilities it presents, you can have an impact on how your child feels.

Ways you can help your child engage with STEM

Investigate and ask questions about the real world. You can do this by asking open-ended questions, such as:

- Can you describe...?
- I wonder what would happen if...?I
- How would you answer that question...?

What if ...?

Encourage and support activities that are STEM-related.

For younger children, this could include:

 playing games to identify different shapes, numbers and patterns singing songs and nursery rhymes about numbers and playing with building blocks.

For older children, this could include:

- using a digital device to make a movie with special effects
- learning cooking skills

encouraging the use of apps and computer games that are STEM-related.

STEM websites and places for students to explore at home:

<u>Museum Victoria</u> cares for the state's scientific and cultural collections. Museum Victoria includes Melbourne Museum and Scienceworks. These museums provide stimulating exhibits and activities ensuring that families can maximise their STEM experience.

Zoos Victoria, including Healesville Sanctuary, Melbourne Zoo and Werribee Open Range Zoo provide families with the opportunity to discover a wild range of wildlife and learn about conservation.

The <u>Digital Technologies Hub for families</u> provides learning resources on digital technologies. The families section of the hub contains information, activities, careers advice and cybersafety links for families to explore.

<u>Cosmos</u> is a science magazine published in Australia. Its accompanying website has the latest science news, discoveries, developments and events.



<u>Backyard Species Discovery</u> is a virtual citizen science Bush Blitz. It provides a virtual expedition to add to our knowledge of Australian biodiversity while keeping everyone busy at home and contributing data to the Atlas of Living Australia.

PHOTOGRAPHING, FILMING AND RECORDING STUDENTS POLICY

RATIONALE:

This policy outlines the practices that Findon Primary School has in place for the collection, use and disclosure of images of students to ensure compliance with the *Privacy and Data Protection Act 2014* (Vic). It also explains the circumstances in which Findon PS will seek parent/caregiver consent and how consent can be provided and/or withdrawn.

As a general rule, 'use' relates to images which are shared and distributed only within the school for school purposes (i.e. ID photos, Compass), whilst 'disclosure' is used for images which are shared and distributed outside of the school staff and are available to other students, parents/caregivers and the wider school community.

AIM:

To explain to parents/caregivers how Findon Primary School will collect, use and disclose photographs, video and recordings of students, how parent/caregiver consent can be provided and how it can be withdrawn. This policy applies to the general collection, use and disclosure of photographs, video and recordings ('images') of students.

IMPLEMENTATION:

Findon PS will ensure that parents/caregivers are notified upon enrolment and at the commencement of each school year of the ways in which our school may use images of students. There are many occasions during the school year where staff photograph, film or record students participating in school activities or events, for example classroom activities, sports events, concerts, excursions, camps etc. We do this for many reasons including to celebrate student participation and achievement, showcase particular learning programs, document a student's learning journey, advertise the school and communicate with our parents/caregivers and school community in newsletters.

Findon PS will use student images reasonably, appropriately and sensitively, consistent with our obligations under the Child Safe Standards and our school's Child Safety Policy and Child Safe Code of Conduct. If at any time a parent/caregiver or student has a concern about the use of any images they should contact the school to speak with the Principal.

In addition to the processes outlined below, parents/caregivers can contact the school at any time to withdraw their consent for any future collection, use or disclosure of images of their child. However:

- If the images have already been published and are in the public domain, it may not be possible for consent to be withdrawn
- There may be occasions when the school will record whole of school or large group events (and make those recordings available to the school community through DVD sales etc.) such as the school concert, speech nights, sports events etc. and if your child participates, they may appear in these recordings which will be available to the whole school community
- The school can still collect, use and disclose images in circumstances where consent is not required (see below for more information).

Official School Photographs

Each year Findon PS will arrange for a professional photographer to take official school photographs of students. This will generally involve class photos, individual photos and whole school photo being taken, and in some cases family photos.

Official school photographs may be:

- purchased by parents/caregivers
- used for school identification cards
- stored on CASES21 for educational and administrative purposes.

Findon PS will notify parents/caregivers in advance of the official school photographs being taken to give them an opportunity to decide whether their child will be included in the official school photographs.

Ratified by School Council June 2022 Review date June 2025 Parents/caregivers who choose to opt out of having their child participate in official school photographs must contact the office before the date photos are scheduled to be taken to advise that their child will not participate. There is no obligation on any parent/caregiver to purchase any photographs taken.

Images for use and disclosure within the school community and ordinary school communications

From time to time Findon PS may photograph, film or record students to use within the school community, including:

- in the school's communication, learning and teaching tools (for example, emails, classroom blogs or apps that can only be accessed by students, parents/caregivers or school staff with passwords e.g. Compass)
- for display in school classrooms, on noticeboards etc.
- to support student's health and wellbeing (e.g. photographs of pencil grip to assist in Occupational Therapy (OT) assessments)

An Annual Consent Form and Collection Notice will be distributed to parents/caregivers on enrolment and also at the beginning of each school year.

Images to be used or disclosed outside the school community

External use or disclosure by the school

Photographs, video or recordings of students may also be used in publications that are accessible to the public, including on the school's website (including in the school newsletter which is publicly available on the website).

The Annual Consent Form and Collection Notice also covers these types of uses and will be distributed to parents/caregivers on enrolment and also at the beginning of each school year. Findon PS will notify parents/caregivers individually if the school is considering using any images of their child for specific advertising or promotional purposes.

Media

The media, or the Department of Education and Training's media team, may seek to photograph, film or record students for a news story or school event. This may include broadcast media, online or social media or print media, including newspapers and magazine publications.

When our school receives such requests Findon PS will:

- provide parents/caregivers with information about the organisation involved and when/for what purposes the photography, filming or recording will occur
- seek prior, express parent/caregiver consent in writing.

Students will only be photographed, filmed or recorded by the media at school if express consent is provided for that specific media event. Neither the school nor the Department own or control any photographs, video or recordings of students taken by the media.

Other external collection, use or disclosure

If there is a situation which will involve the collection, use or disclosure of images of students by or to third parties which is not otherwise covered by this policy, Findon PS will:

- provide parents/caregivers with information about the event or activity, the organisation involved and when the photography, filming or recording will occur
- seek prior, express parent/caregiver consent in writing.

School performances, sporting events and other school approved activities

Findon PS permits parents/caregivers and invited guests to photograph, film or record school performances, sporting events and other school approved activities of their own child, with the exception of swimming activities and those events photographed, filmed of recorded by a third party to be sold to the community (e.g. Production).

Findon PS requests that parents/caregivers, students and invited guests who photograph, film or record school activities only do so for their own personal record of events and do not publish the images in any form, including on social media, without the prior consent of persons whose children may also appear in the images. Neither the school nor the Department own or control any images of students taken by parents/caregivers, students or their invited guests at school activities. It is strongly advised that images only contain your child/ren.

Images to manage student behaviour or fulfil our school's legal obligations

On occasion it may be necessary for school staff to photograph, film or record students when necessary to:

- fulfil legal obligations, including to:
 - o take reasonable steps to reduce the risk of reasonably foreseeable harm to students, staff and visitors (duty of care)
 - provide a safe and suitable workplace (occupational health and safety law)
- for identification purposes, when necessary to implement discipline and/or behaviour management policies.

Findon PS does not require or obtain consent from parents/caregivers or students to photograph, film or record students for these reasons. However, when Findon PS photographs, films or records a student for any of these purposes, staff will only collect and use such images in a way that is reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances.

Staff use of personal devices

School staff may use their own personal devices to capture images of students for reasonable and legitimate educational purposes. If this occurs, staff are expected to upload the images to the school server and delete the images from their device within a week of the images being captured.

COMMUNICATION & EVALUATION:

This policy will be communicated to the community through the newsletter at the beginning of the school year and prior to school community events. The policy will be available on the school website and via the front office upon request. It will be communicated to staff via briefing and through relevant induction programs and parent information sessions. This policy shall be reviewed as part of the school's three year review cycle.

HOMEWORK POLICY

RATIONALE:

Homework comprises of activities that enrich and support learning, through students reading, talking and experiencing the world around them. There is also a place for more formal, structured homework that enriches and enhances student learning. This type of homework complements classroom learning, helps to foster positive study habits and provides an opportunity for students to take responsibility for their own learning.

Findon Primary School has developed this Homework Policy, in consultation with the School Council to support student learning and connectedness by:

- providing opportunities for students to review, revise and reinforce newly acquired skills
- providing opportunities for students to apply new knowledge
- providing opportunities for students to prepare for future lessons
- encouraging students to enrich or extend knowledge individually, collectively and imaginatively
- fostering lifelong learning and study habits
- supporting learning partnerships with parents/caregivers.

AIM:

To outline to our school community the Department of Education and Training (DET) and Findon Primary School's policy requirements relating to homework. This policy applies to students in all year levels and staff responsible for setting and monitoring homework at Findon Primary School.

DEFINITON:

Homework is tasks assigned to students by teachers that are meant to be carried out during non school hours.

IMPLEMENTATION:

At Findon Primary School all homework set by teachers will be:

- purposeful
- curriculum aligned
- appropriate to students' skill level and age
- designed to help students develop as independent learners
- monitored by the teacher
- where appropriate, provide opportunities for parents/caregivers to partner in their child's learning.

The types of homework that teachers at Findon Primary School may include are:

- completing consolidation exercises for mathematics or other subject areas
- completing science investigations
- making or designing an artwork
- practising and playing musical instruments or performances
- practising spelling words
- practising sport skills
- practising words/phrases learnt in a language other than English

- reading/preparing background material for a subject
- reading for pleasure
- researching topics associated with set class work
- applying new skills to home context such as:
 - o planning and cooking food, including following a recipe
 - helping to plan a day trip or holiday, including timings, directions and costs
 - o growing plants
 - o reviewing their favourite film or book
 - o writing a diary entry
- engaging with parents in learning activities such as:
 - o rehearsing a presentation with parent/caregivers, and seeking their feedback
 - o interviewing a family member as part of a research project.

SHARED EXPECTATIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Homework is a shared responsibility between the school, teachers, students and their parents/caregivers. In order to get the most out of homework tasks, it is important that everyone understands their obligations and responsibilities.

Responsibilities and expectations for leaders at Findon Primary School are to:

• advise teachers, students and parents/caregivers of homework expectations at the beginning of the school year and provide them with access to the homework policy.

Responsibilities and expectations for teaching teams at Findon Primary School are to:

- set homework that is curriculum aligned and appropriate to the student's skill level and age
- ensure homework tasks are purposeful this means they are deliberately designed and planned to support student learning (so, they are not 'busy work' or where students 'finish off' work they did/could not complete in class)
- assess homework and provide timely and practical feedback
- ensure the amount of homework set supports a student to engage with a range of recreational, family and cultural activities outside of school hours
- offer opportunities for families to engage in their children's learning.

Responsibilities and expectations for **students** are:

- being aware of the school's homework policy
- discussing homework expectations with their parents/caregivers
- accepting responsibility for the completion of homework tasks within set time frames
- following up on feedback provided by teachers
- seeking assistance when difficulties arise
- organising their time to manage home obligations, participation in physical activity and sports, recreational and cultural activities.

Responsibilities and expectations for parents/caregivers are:

- ensuring there is a balance between the time spent on homework and recreational, family and cultural activities
- talking to teachers about any concerns they have about the homework
- discussing homework with their child in their first language, if English is not the main language spoken at home,
- in dialogue, linking homework to:
 - o previous experiences the child and/or parent/caregiver may have had
 - o family culture(s), history(ies) and language(s)
 - o relevant services, clubs, associations and community.
- ensuring there is a quiet study area for their child to complete homework.

SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS AND PARENTS/CAREGIVERS

Findon Primary School understands that students have different learning strengths, preferences and interests and may approach learning activities and homework differently. If parents/caregivers are concerned their child may not understand the homework tasks that have been set or is spending a long period of time completing their homework, we encourage parents/caregivers to speak to their child's teacher, to ensure appropriate adjustments can be made for their child.

This policy will be communicated to our school community in the following ways:

- Tabled and discussed at staff briefing
- Available publicly on our school's website
- Included in staff information book
- Reminders in our school newsletter
- Discussed at parent information nights/sessions as required
- Discussed with students at (individual level, cohort levels, assembly)
- Hard copy available from front office upon request

This policy will be reviewed every three years.

PERSONAL PROPERTY POLICY

RATIONALE:

Schools respect and appreciate the diversity the community holds in relation to matters of personal significance that are special or valuable items. Findon Primary School understands that staff, students and community members may sometimes like to bring items of such nature to school. Communicating responsibilities in relation to these items ensures clarity. This policy applies to all school activities, including camps and excursions.

AIMS:

To explain Findon Primary School's policy in relation to personal property and to ensure that special or valuable items of personal property are not brought to school.

IMPLEMENTATION:

- The Department of Education and Training does not have insurance for personal property of staff, students and visitors.
- Findon Primary School does not take responsibility for items of personal property that are lost, stolen or damaged at school or during school activities. Damage to personal property brought to school is the responsibility of the owner of that property.
- Findon Primary School encourages staff and students **not** to bring items of value to school, or to obtain appropriate insurance for such items. If students or staff choose to bring items of value to school, they are encouraged to ensure they are locked up during the day or stored securely at the office until the end of the day, where items may be collected by the student/parent/caregiver or staff member.
